SPIDERS

SEE SOMETHING...SAY SOMETHING...

Every month we will focus on specific pests that plague residents here in the Northwest. This month we will focus on Spiders. With the colder nights coming, spiders may be making their way inside your home for some of the warmth. Most of us would just prefer having them stay outside.

The most common spiders here in the Northwest are the Orb Weaver Spiders (various), the Giant House Spider, the Jumping spider (various) the Long-Bodied Cellar Spider (long legs), and the False Black Widow. We do not have any poisonous spiders here in Western Washington.

As ugly as spiders can be they are a necessity in keeping the other pests out of your home. Their main food sources are roaches, earwigs, flies, mosquitoes, and moths. Spiders are nocturnal insects which means you will mostly see them at night when they hunt. Spiders may help prevent possible structural damage and the spread of diseases that these other pests may bring with them.
